## Suggested ways to improve compliance

	2. Review tobacco public health information campaign strategy plans and activity to ensure compliance with FCTC and 5.3 guidelines
1.2	1. Develop a strategy for raising member's and/or officer awareness on tobacco industry strategies and tactics
	2. Develop a strategy for countering tobacco industry disinformation of the public
	3. Identify and make available a list of national, EU, local organisations, front group & individuals affiliated or supportive of the tobacco industry. (Tobacco Tactics
	<u>website</u> may be a useful resource)
	4. Share new intelligence on tobacco lobbying attempts via the <u>Smokefree Action Coalition</u> network.
2.1	1. Develop guidance for officers and members on what constitutes necessary / appropriate interaction and the need for transparency.
	2. Develop guidance for trading standard officers. This could be based on the <u>existing quidance</u> .
	3. Develop a system (with particular focus on trading standards) for the publication of details of any necessary meetings or interactions with the industry, including an
	explanation of why they were required and how they are consistent with Article 5.3 of the FCTC. See template communications log as an example [link]

4.2	1. Promote a revised code to staff and members via council communications channels including intranet, staff briefings, team meetings and internal newsletters.

review	reports of face-to-face meetings with the industry to ensure the council has met the requirements of Article 5.3. Attempts by the tobacco industry to meet with
	Elected Members or Council staff which were refused should be recorded alongside any records of contacts so these can be reviewed to ensure the policy is operating
	effectively.
